Before the finished product wrought;

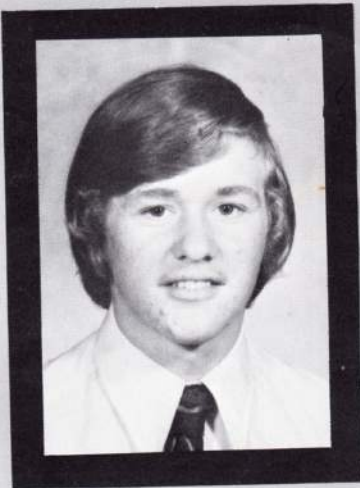

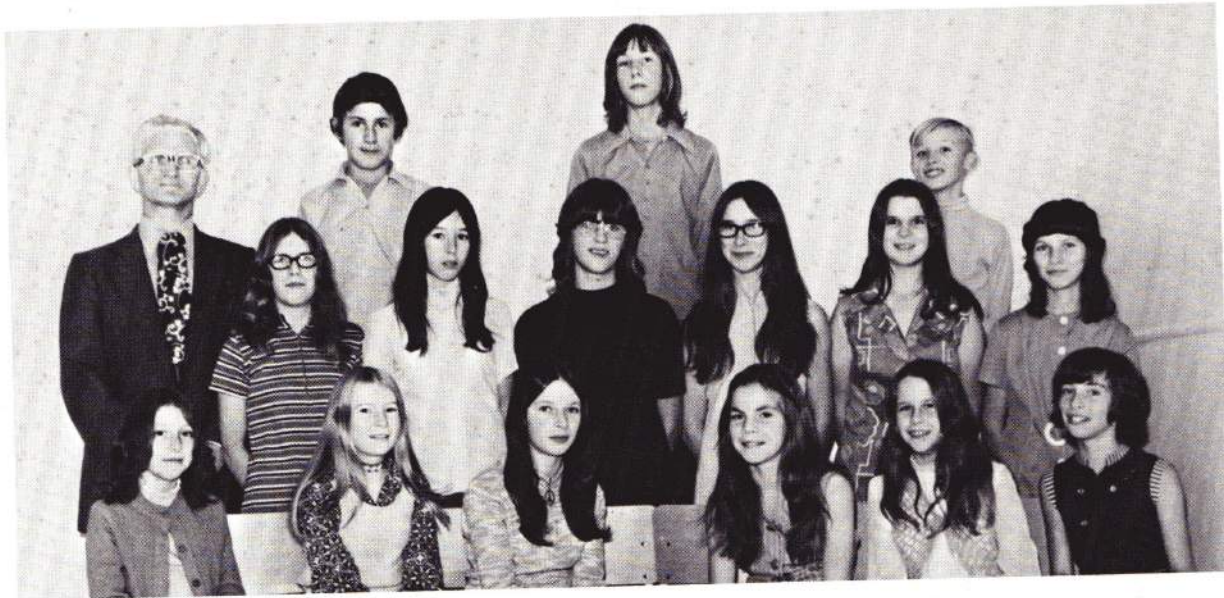
